Instead of leaving the money in your checking account, an option is to deposit your funds in a short-term savings vehicle that you won't be tempted to access without a good reason. Since these accounts tend to be very liquid, you'll generally be able to withdraw money quickly when you do need it.

# **Under Control**

Avoid activities that might lead to spending money, such as going to the mall or browsing online shopping sites, unless you know you can resist making a purchase. People often shop when they're bored, so finding other things to do with your leisure time can remove the temptation to shop.
